## 2010 Writing Competition Winners



Over 1,000 entries were submitted to the 2010 Utrust Writing Competition. Students, faculty, parents, and even a grandmother wrote about different school employees that were making a difference.

Stephanie Shaffer, a student at Trousdale County High School, won the hearts of all who read her beautiful story. Shaffer wrote about Christie Glover, who is a Trousdale High School teacher. Glover is also Shaffer's foster parent. "She took my life and helped me turn it back around, the way it is supposed to be, the way I have longed for it to be for a while," Shaffer said. "She taught me that it's not bad to trust somebody, and that it is ok to let people care about me." Shaffer won first place and received \$1,000 for her entry in the writing competition.

Rhonda Winstead, a guidance counselor at Russellville Elementary School in Hamblen County took second place and received \$500 for her essay entitled "It'll be fine....I promise," about her former 5th grade teacher, Wayne Smith. Winstead and Smith were reunited after 20 years at the presentation of her award. "It's hard to describe the feeling," Smith said when asked how it felt to know he made such a

difference in Winstead's life. "As a teacher you recognize the potential a student has and you do what you can to give them the tools they need to be successful and hope that they use them. But Rhonda was a wonderful student. She doesn't give herself enough credit for her success," Smith continued.

Beth Weatherford of Lakewood Middle School took third place, winning \$250 for her story titled, "The All American Teacher." Weatherford's story was about fellow teacher, Susan Parker. Weatherford praised Parker for her enthusiasm for teaching. Parker established an after school program called the Adventure Club that allows students to participate in hands on experiences, like planting and harvesting a garden, building survival shelters, land navigation, and they even built a compost machine. Weatherford also commended Parker for her services to our county, as she serves as an Engineer Officer in the Tennessee Army National Guard.

The writing competition has proven to be a huge success and we are excited to continue this tradition. 

# ELIMINATE SNOW DAY UNEMPLOYMENT CLAIMS

Many school boards in

Tennessee have employees who file claims for unemployment compensation on snow days. This results in significant costs to those boards. If you object to the State **Department of Labor and Workforce Development granting** unemployment benefits for such days, you are told that employees are eligible to receive unemployment compensation benefits because payment was withheld for days school was not in session because of snow. Under such circumstances, employees do not receive the expected income for those days. It seems a bit harsh to try to deny such employees the income they have come to depend upon.

There may be a better way of handling this issue that results in a win/win situation. School boards traditionally contract with bus drivers, cooks, teacher assistants and some other employees to be paid for 180 days when school is in session.

We suggest that instead of paying hourly employees only for the hours and days worked, divide the money that employees will be paid for the 180 days that school is in session (or however many days the board intends to pay them in a school term). Contract with the employees to pay them that amount in equal installments over a ten-month

period instead of paying them just for days worked.

A board that wants to provide an even more significant help to its employees should offer an option to employees to receive their annual pay in 26 equal installments spread over the entire year. This is an option that many teachers prefer and one, which is a great help to those employees who have a hard time saving a portion of their earnings to meet expenses during the summer months. In the process, your board will completely eliminate the unemployment compensation costs for snow days.

Advantages to make it a win/win situation:

- I.Employees will know their income whether school is in session or not.
- 2. No unemployment claims related to weather will be filed.

Employee morale will improve because all employees will be on the same payment schedule.


A BIG thanks to our cafeteria staffs around Tennessee for fueling the student's think tanks and helping them cross the finish line to success!
